The bisque pottery is ready to be glazed by you. This class offers an opportunity to experiment in colors and designs with glazes, and a functional, personalized piece of pottery when you are done. This class would complement the Hand Built Pottery class for practice/experimenting in glazing. All materials are included in the class fee.

Bring thimble, scissors, seam ripper, needle, and needle threader. Three 2-hour follow-up sessions allow participants to perfect their skills.

Irish Revolution: 1916-1922 (#3676) *Friday: March 17; 12:30 – 2:00 p.m.*

The Irish Revolution began Easter 1916. On Monday morning April 24, about 1,200 members of the Irish Volunteers and Irish Citizen Army mustered in several downtown Dublin locations. Several key buildings were occupied, but the volunteers were poorly organized. Attempts at recruiting reinforcements failed. By week's end, when the rebels surrendered, at least 485 were dead: 260 civilians, 126 British soldiers, 82 Irish rebels, and 17 police. Another 2,600 were wounded, including 2,200 civilians and rebels, 370 British soldiers, and 29 policemen. The Revolution continued for six more years, until the Irish Free State was established December 6, 1922. Location: Liberty Hall, 325 W. Of the 21 camps in Idaho, Camp Rupert was the largest, at one time housing over 4,000 prisoners and about 1,000 army personnel and civilians. It was designated a base camp from which 24 branch camps in Idaho, Montana, and Oregon were managed.
