

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Little did we know, as we began the Spring semester 2020, how it would end. With our classes cancelled mid-way through the semester because of the COVID-19 pandemic, we have all missed the physical and intellectual stimulation, as well as the close personal associations we have loved and expected of NKA over the years.

Also, we recently have lost two key NKA members: Allan Priddy, who, among other things, conducted our story-telling sessions, and Dr. Bill Brydon, past president (2008-2009) and long-time facilitator of our Preview to Symphony series. They will both be sorely missed.

We also face an unprecedented future for the Fall semester. Because of social distancing restrictions, we have cancelled our travel, dance, and card game classes. Furthermore, one of the facilities we have used recently for several of our activities and lectures, Quail Ridge, will be unavailable for the Fall—so all of those activities will be moved to Liberty Hall.

In addition, our lecture series in Liberty Hall will be impacted. The downstairs room where we normally meet, rather than having space for around one hundred, will have seating for only 25. Therefore, our lecture classes will be conducted in the larger upstairs room, which will hold 49 participants. Such a change will necessitate climbing stairs for those attending the lecture in that room. We will also use the downstairs main room for overflow and for those members who cannot climb the stairs. The lecture will be fed live, via Zoom, from the upstairs venue to the

downstairs room. In addition, the presenter will attend the downstairs classroom after the lecture for live questions and discussion. The combination of the two rooms will allow some 74 people to attend lectures in person.

Activities scheduled for the small downstairs room at Liberty Hall will also be impacted. That room will only hold 12 people maximum, so any classes held in that room will be so limited. All members attending lectures or other activities will be required to wear face covers and maintain social distancing. These are ISU requirements for Fall. We will still follow School District 25 class closure procedures.

In addition to NKA members being able to attend lectures in person, each lecture will be available live via Zoom for all NKA members registered for Fall semester, and will be available for later viewing via YouTube. This procedural change will actually facilitate more NKA members to attend any and all lectures. Therefore, we highly recommend that you continue your NKA membership for the Fall semester. Some classes will only be available via Zoom. For those classes where you may attend in person or via Zoom you will be asked on the registration form to indicate how you will attend the class: in person or via Zoom.

I hope you are all keeping journals during these historic times. Maybe some future NKA history lecture will be "The Great COVID-19 Pandemic in 2020 Hindsight." Together, though apart, we will see this through.


